For the sake of completeness, however, it has seemed best to include a discussion of certain matters of merely historic interest. It is hoped that the list of references at the end of each chapter will constitute a good working bibliography for those desirous of going to original sources. These lists are not by any means exhaustive, but the references have been selected as the most worthwhile of the many hundreds which have been consulted in the preparation of this work. To Drs.
